Uyghur Forced Labor Prevention Act

- Guilty until proven innocent
- Goods that are mined, produced, or manufactured in Xinjiang Province China
- Presumption that all goods from Xinjiang Province include Uyghur labor
- Contract laborers

Why are companies reshoring now?




- Mood of America has changed the rise of worldwide ethnocentrism
- Tax Reform Act of 2017
- 232 and 301 tariffs on imports into the U.S.
- Global pandemic
- Advanced Technologies
- U.S. Federal, State, and Local incentives
- New, favorable legislation
 - Infrastructure Act
 - Chips and Science Act
 - Inflation Reduction and Sustainability Act
- Enhanced enforcement of Buy America Act,
 FARs, Build America, Buy America (BABA)



Average Annual Salaries of Production Workers/Machine Operators (World)

The difference in wages that manufacturing workers earn in different regions of the world. This helps to explain the reason why manufacturing goods that are "high-touch, low-tech" are more suited to low-cost countries. The more labor content in goods produced, the more attractive low-cost labor countries appear to be.

What About Medical Device Manufacturers? 2023 Xometry Survey - Trends

Additive Manufacturing: 3D Printing – fast and efficient – became very popular during the pandemic

Injection Molding: domestic services for injection molding amid global supply chain disruptions improves response times

Reshoring: 67% of medical industry professionals are "likely" to "extremely likely" to reshore

Sustainability: Goes hand-in-hand with Reshoring and reducing your carbon footprint

According to Xometry, 2/3 of medical industry professionals are likely to add American suppliers in 2023



What happens if we start to source more in the US?

2021 Thomas.net State of North American • **Manufacturing Report, 83%** of manufacturers are planning to add North American suppliers to their supply chains within a year.

If American manufacturers add an average of 11 suppliers each, that amounts to a \$443 billion injection into the U.S. economy.

The economic effects are ASTOUNDING!

U.S./Mexico Border Port of Laredo Largest Land Port in the US - Nearshoring

- 14,000 trucks per day
- Automotive & Industrial Equipment
- Automated weight and tracking 14 seconds to scan each truck
- Significant development on both sides of the border
- Connects to 4 nearby Interstate highways





It's not so easy to leave a foreign location

- Employment contracts
- Permits to leave
- Wait time
- Tools, dies, molds
- IP process and technology
- Supply base considerations



Waterlogic US Manufacturing Location

- Headquartered in the UK
- Manufacturing in Qindao, China
- Growth market is in the U.S.
- Global Strategy
 - Manufacture close to customers
 - Develop U.S. supply base
 - Consolidate U.S. offices and hire
 200 people
 - Avoid China 301 tariffs
 - Sell to U.S. Gov






Waterlogic systems provide more than 50 million people with clean drinking water every day.



Reshoring Success – GE Geospring Water Heaters

- GE Appliance Park in Louisville re-opened
- New, automated and highly engineered production lines
- Negotiations with unions



Reshoring Failure: Otis Elevator

- Opened new manufacturing plant in Florence, SC, bringing a production line back from Mexico
- Project failed and cost the company \$60 million in lost business
- Primary reasons for the failure:
 - Lack of skilled labor
 - No partnering with local schools and colleges to train new workers
 - Concurrent ERP implementation
